

Minor Scale Progressions: 1.1 "Relative" Minor

(One-Octave, One-speed Practice drill. Memorize.)

NOTE: These are two minor scale types--**Natural/Aeolian** and **Melodic Minor**.

When combined in the pattern below they look like this.
